# Introduction to Culturally and Contextually Relevant Evidence-Based Parent Training



### Process of Culturally Adapting Programs

- Requires patience and resources
- Requires careful assessment of:
  - Local political, religious and economic contexts
  - Cultural norms
  - Family practices



#### **Steps in The Process**

CAL AID

- Gather data
- Careful assessment of the best EBP to culturally adapt
- Implement the original program materials
- Staff selection and training/supervision to assure quality implementation and fidelity
- Cultural adaptations made with pilot groups
- Revisions of program materials to improve engagement of families
- Empowerment evaluation to improve outcomes
- Disseminate the results of the effectiveness of the culturally adapted version.
